County Report

It's been a busy couple of months Whilst the Warwickshire Tax notices which show the following increases.

SDC has increased its Council Tax by 1.5% which marks an increase of £2.05p for the year on a Band D property from £137.07 to £139.12.

Warwickshire County Council has increased its council tax receipts by 4.99per cent with 2% of the increase contribute beina ringfenced to towards increasing costs of Adult Social Care and Support. This will amount to about £5 extra a month or £60 for the year for an average Band D household. In total, this 4.99 per cent council tax increase is equivalent to an increase of £1.25 per week for a Band D dwelling.

The Council Tax for Moreton Morrell in respect of Band D which includes for Stratford District precepts Council. Warwickshire County Council. Warwickshire Police together with the precept for Moreton Morrell will therefore be £1866.78 per annum which is slightly less than Welleshourne

Police both across the district and county precept which has been increased by with a lot of focus on budgeting. You £24 per annum following its public will all have received your Council consultation, the increase is being used to recruit and train an additional 100 more staff. The good news though is that PC Catherine Morgan has now been relocated back into the Wellesbourne SNT.

> The county council is still facing large budget cuts and in the next financial year has to find savings of £9 million followed by an expected £16 million between 2019 and 2020. This is on top of the £100 million it has had to save since 2010.

> Despite these cuts, the authority will use some of its £370 million budget to invest £5.7 million into children's social care services and £1.3 million into additional adult social care and support - just over £153 million is now being allocated to adult social care. The council will also spend £2.5 million on a digital transformation programme to make it easier for people to access its online services and help it to become "an enabler for residents to help themselves.



Other investments include £200,000 into digital fibre optic hubs to enhance communications in communities and £330.000 to convert six school-based children's centres into specialist provision for pupils with special needs. £100,000 to expand transport planning team to "maximise the funding received from developers to deliver the infrastructure requirements for associated housing and business growth across the county. An investment of £108,000 will be made into maintaining the council's library network including Sunday opening while £150,000 will go towards a joint project to integrate those for those in need of support to mental health issues, homelessness and drug abuse. The council will also invest £1.4 million into home to school transport and invest £500,000 into Warwickshire Fire and Rescue Service to reduce the service's savings target.

Wellesbourne Airfield

SDC is continuing to progress with a Compulsory Purchase Order for Wellesbourne Airfield and has set aside £1.25M for legal costs.

Medical Centre

I was pleased to attend the official opening of the new Hastings House Medical Centre in Wellesbourne which serves Moreton Morrell and Moreton Paddox and is extremely impressive and will future proof the health services for all the local villages going forward.


The Foxes are a little quieter at night now, the "family planning" is done. The screaming has given way to new calls. There's now a long note that's called with more than a hint of 'Gibbon' about. It. A contact call between them. The breeding season was a dangerous time. Foxes move around a lot then. I've seen five killed on the roads in the area. Our pair seem well bonded, now they just have to have their Cubs and rear them safely. Good luck.

Krista saw a pair of Muntjac walk in front of the cottage before slinking into the trees. It would be great to see a youngster from them.

I was a few miles away recently and watched a Buzzard against blue sky flying at tree top height. From behind me flew a Red Kite. They saw each

other, didn't get too close and showed some respect. That's the second peaceful encounter I've seen.

There was a noisy commotion outside neighbours but birds! Over where the birds all shouting abuse. Blackbirds, Bluetits and Chaffinches, even a couple of Jackdaws joined in. They flew in circles around the edge of the Yew near the top. I guessed why they were voicing their opinions so I got nearer to see if I could prove it. Once under the beautiful old tree I stood still while the birds continued their protest. arriving was probably the last straw for the larger bird being mobbed. Sure enough a Tawny Owl leaned forward then flew 100 yards to another tree. It was only trying to sleep and was no real threat to the smaller birds. At least I got to see it close up. Interesting how separate species join together in a common cause to make an effort and change a situation. Hmmmmm maybe a lesson there.



Nature Watch

APRIL

March was the start of Spring, the weather often turbulent, buds swelling and the month of the 'twig'. Every year I watch to see the first bird to carry a twig to it's nest. It's often a Pigeon. Starlings and Sparrows are usually first with dry grass and feathers. This year's winner is . . . Magpie. Coming in at number two is the Raven. The Raven by us has gathered twigs from the top of the pine tree and a beakful from the Wellingtonia (Redwood).

There's an old folk tale telling of birds getting married on Valentine's Day. Well, all I can say is they must have had a long engagement then. Many species are flying in pairs long before then.

I put our third nest box up and within Bluetit minutes а investigating. It hasn't looked since mind you.

It's always worth putting up a nest box even if they never nest in it. Birds often use them as roosts to get them through Footnote: the Winter nights.

The hedgerows have their first sprinkling of green, thank heavens. Hawthorn and Elder show first, Honeysuckle in the woods and the Horse chestnuts are pending their 'sticky buds'. That takes me back to Junior school and the Nature Table.

The warm spell in late February saw Red Admirals. first called Red 'Admirables', Tortoiseshell and Brimstone butterflies all take to the air. Butterflies were first called 'Flutterbys' which makes more sense. I think I au go back to that.

March early popped some Frogspawn into the pond to help start a colony. Talking of starting a colony, on St Patrick's Day we had the special arrival of four Hedgehogs to the garden. Now this is Natural History 'History' for this area. It appears to be Hedgehog Heaven with no Hedgehogs. I suspect many years ago a colony died out here and we maybe just too far away from the nearest villages to be repopulated. We are doing what's called a 'Soft release'. Each Hedgehog has its own house (rent free) with two feeding stations and the pond nearby. We have two males and two females with, very possibly more to come, so we should have a viable breeding group. They may stay in the garden or wander off. They can smell each other so their paths will cross, it's up to them. I'll let you know how it goes. Hedgehogs do have a taste for Frogs though, so my hopes for one colony may be eaten by the other.



I had long put my pen down, but just to say on the first Hedgehog night the very large female ventured out to explore. She found the pond, had a drink then walked in different directions always returning to the pond as if she were mapping part of the garden in her head. A three quarter moon shone making it easier to see her, then the unexpected happened. From the bottom of the garden flew a Barn Owl back lit by the moon. It flew towards me to within about twenty feet then moved right under the .walnut tree and into the field. Magical to say the least. Now I'm just hoping the Hedgehogs choose to come home.

Lambing weekend success

Families flocked in droves to Moreton Morrell College over the weekend of 23-24 March to see lambing ewes and their newborns. The return of the popular lambing event saw over 2000 visitors enjoy the spectacle of over 50 live births at Nether Moreton Farm which forms part of the agricultural college's campus.

The farm has a flock of 520 ewes and it is expected that just under 1,000 lambs will have been born by the end of the lambing season. Members of the public were able to witness the drama of new life being born on a working farm, meet cows and their calves as well as get the opportunity to hold and bottle-feed pet lambs.

Farm Manager Henry Dingle said: "The event went really well. It's good the public in to see the lambs being born and also to see where their lamb and beef is produced. As a country, we urgently need more young people to replace the older farmers that are retiring from the industry so hopefully this kind event will help to attract the next generation into agriculture."

Last summer, WCG's visionary project to restore Moreton Hall and turn it into a country hotel and hospitality training school was given permission to start from key backers the Heritage Lottery Fund. Since then much has been accomplished including the completion of a number of conservation surveys (which discovered a colony bats), the formation of a hospitality industry advisory board and the appointment of architects.

This year key appointments have been made for the interior design work and a leading firm of interpretive designers have been tasked to create a 'heritage' room that will showcase the history of this magnificent building. The college is still keen to gather memories, photos and information which brings the heritage of Moreton to life so anyone willing to donate documents or



Telephone & Online Scams

Sound too good to be true or just doesn't sound quite right?

Then it probably involves some form of scam.

There are various telephone scams which have been doing the rounds over the last few years. These scams come in various quises.

It could be from a person with a foreign accent who tells you they are calling from BT or Microsoft and that you have a problem with your internet that only they can fix. They go on to advise you that you Stay calm, remember you are in control, need to download a small piece of software which lets them take control of your pc/laptop. They can sound very convincing but ultimately they are just after either your money or your details.

are a pension advisor and offers to make you money by unlocking your pension and link: investing it elsewhere.

Then there is the cold caller offering you the chance to invest your money in a scheme where there's minimal risk of losing money. Often the returns will be unbelievable, far more impressive than anything you can get from your bank or https://www.warwickshire.gov.uk/scams even by sticking your money into a few FTSE 100 shares.

But of course, it will all be rubbish.

Scammers may also impersonate your bank and try to convince you there's been a security breach on your account and that needs to be fixed. Of course, to do that they'll need your account details, including your PIN. But give the details out and your account will be drained.

Or there's the courier scam. You'll receive a call, supposedly from the police or your bank, stating that it has seen a fraudulent payment on your card and it needs to be replaced. A courier will be sent to collect your card and arrange for a new one. By now they have your card, your name and your home address. Neither a bank nor the police will ever send a courier to your home or ask for your PIN or login details.

Increasingly scammers are using sophisticated techniques like hold music to convince you a call is genuine.

What to do if you get a scam call

don't give out any personal or payment details, so they can't access your bank. If you aren't sure of the caller just put the phone down and report it to your phone service provider.
