From the Allotments

Whilst on a recent train journey, I came across an article in a magazine commenting upon the results of an extensive survey published in the Journal of Public Health. Overall, the findings of this study indicated that one single session of allotment gardening can improve both self-esteem and mood. Furthermore, in the study, allotment gardeners had a reduced level of abnormal psychological functioning than non-gardeners. Thus, it went on, in order to improve health and well-being, people in the UK should be encouraged to take part in short bouts of allotment gardening. Health organisations and policy makers should consider the potential of allotment gardening as a long-term tool for combatting the increasing prevalence of ill-health and local public authorities should seek to provide community allotment plots to allow residents to have regular opportunities to partake in gardening activities.

I am aware that we are bombarded with surveys and advice but I did think this one made good reading especially as in our village, we are blessed with allotments. We still have some space available for quarter or half plots, so if you are interested, please let me know. For an investment of £5 or £10 per annum, you get access to the best gym facilities!

Nature Watch

JANUARY

Early January, just before dawn breaks, Venus hangs brightly in the southern sky. Robins fill their lungs with chilly air and begin to sing. One by one they stake their claim on their chosen tall trees of many shapes and species that stand around me in silhouette as I listen. First

light is beginning to make itself known. I'm standing in a circle of five Robins all singing at each other.

The dark shape of a Heron flies silently across Venus. It's large wings in a relaxed flap as it heads towards the lakes at Ashorne. There's more than a hint of pterodactyl about it in this light.

The Robin that holds the territory nearest the cottage has prime position with sunflower hearts rarely running out. He had a partner

before the end of last year, he sings, stays near her and chases off any other Robin that comes near to her or the food.

Later that day and near Newbold Comyn an air incident was about to happen. Now, I'm nor sure if anyone reads this scribble but, do you remember I wrote last year about a Peregrine that bullied a Gull? Well, I'll carry on anyway. In the same location as before a Gull cried out in panic. It sped away as a Peregrine flew towards me at treetop height. It had no interest in the Gull because it was under attack from two Sparrowhawks. The tables were turned now the Falcon was being bullied by two smaller Hawkes. The Sparrowhawks took turns in flying high then swooping down on the Peregrine. The Falcon's only defense was to turn on its back in mid flight and thrust its feet and talons out in the direction of the incoming attack. The Sparrowhawks anticipated this and pulled out at the last moment. This went on for a couple of minutes with the Peregrine screaming all the time. The Sparrowhawks had proved a point and flew off.

A few days later a Peregrine flew over me in Norton Lindsey. It came in a straight line from Leamington, looking stunning with all its markings clear to see. It may even have been the same bird.

It spent a few moments looking in my



direction scrutinising for any movement then trotted off. I love a little moment like that.

Now a few minutes after that and within a few yards there was a rare and exotic African bird wondering about as large as life. It looked very dapper in grey plumage. It had a white face, red jowls and a black neck. The bird stood a little taller than a chicken and seemed to have no fear of passing cars.

Not a single Twitcher stirred in a bush. Of course, if I told you it was an escaped Guinea Fowl that would only ruin the story. If that Fox gets its scent it may well be an extinct exotic bird!

After a very chilly but successful return of the live lambing event last year, this popular family weekend makes a welcome return to Moreton Morrell College on 23-24 March from 10.30am-4pm. Villagers are invited to come and see the newborn lambs, meet Farmer Henry Dingle, climb upon a tractor and find out how the livestock is looked after.

Nether Moreton Farm features a flock of over 500 sheep, beef cattle

and arable crops. It functions as an educational resource for agricultural and countryside management students, allowing them to be part of a working farm that operates in the same way as any other commercial farm.

As well as being able to see the newborn lambs, members of the public will also be able to participate in tours of the



Animal Welfare Centre and see exotic creatures such as meerkats, raccoon dogs and lots of other interesting characters. Award-winning Pershore juice will be available for sale as well as plants from the Pershore College plant stall.

Solar farm visit

Level 3 Wildlife and Countryside Management students from Moreton Morrell recently enjoyed a trip to a local solar farm to understand how electricity is generated and how that can go hand in hand with wildlife conservation. The students were given a tour of the farm and shown the variety of wildlife habitats that have been created. During the visit



several different species of wildlife were spotted including rabbits, hares and roe deer. The students were also shown bee hives from which the farm produces its own honey. A very interesting and educational afternoon was had by all.

In addition, the dogs got to go on a lovely walk around the college grounds!



Vet physio workshop

In January higher education Veterinary Physiotherapy and Equine

Therapy students were given a two-day kinesiology equine taping course Rock Tape UK.The hands-on course looked at the benefits and techniques for the rider (pain, inflammation, and posture), and horse (pain, inflammation, and movement



correction) to improve muscle function and maintain a level of functionality and comfort for the horse throughout its rehabilitation process.




