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County & District Council Report

It's been a really busy couple of months both at a District and County level in addition to my involvement with the Parish Council.

County Council Community Grants

The new Community Grants closed in June and the applications from both Moreton Morrell Parish Council and Friends of Moreton Morrell Primary School both scored well and I am delighted to confirm that the Parish Council has been awarded £1000 for some outdoor gym equipment for the playing field and the school was granted £500 to purchase two C-Pens. These are a pocket-sized technological device designed to help children who suffer from reading difficulties, such as dyslexia, by reading the text out aloud in a digital voice.

Delegated Members Road Safety Budget

A site meeting with the Road
Safety Team was held earlier this
month and a white lining
improvements scheme, including
edge of carriageway markings
and 'Slow' markings was
approved by the Parish Council in
the July meeting. Speeding on
the top road at Moreton Paddox

has also been raised with
Highways and reported to the
Safer Neighbourhood
Team. However, the officer
highlighted that both speed
humps and rumble strips would
not be appropriate for the village
as there was insufficient street
lighting.

District Council Site Allocations Plan

As part of the Core Strategy the district council has to provide a reserve plan in the event that some of the current sites are not forthcoming or the district falls below the Five Year Housing Land Supply which could be caused by any delays in particular to the development of the two new settlements. This is a directive from the Planning Inspectorate and forms part of the adopted Core Strategy.

Essentially the Site Allocations Plan (SAP) is a holding plan and is what it says on the tin in terms of being reserve sites which have been identified for the purposes of ONLY if needed. The plan will be subject to a six weeks consultation starting in August with formal adoption in Summer 2020.

County & District Council Report cont.

Moreton Morrell along with a number of villages and towns across the district has been included in the SAP and there are sites which have been identified by Stratford District Council as deliverable, if required, which amount to a total of 51 units from land off John Taylor Way and from Brook Lane.

The next Five Year Housing Land Supply figures are due out at the end of July and the indications are that the figures remain robust for the foreseeable future.

Villagers will have the opportunity to comment on the Site Allocations Plan as part of the six weeks' consultation and there will be a link on the Stratford District Council website which I will copy and put on the village Facebook page.

Wellesbourne Airfield

Negotiations are still ongoing with the owners of Wellesbourne Airfield by the executive team at Stratford District Council, however progress is being made.

SDC Corporate Strategy

As a Cabinet member I am currently working with the management team on SDC's corporate strategy over the next

four years which is focusing on the following elements:

- Communicating more effectively with residents
- Increasing importance of climate change and carbon neutral
- Further developing relationships with Coventry and Warwickshire Local Enterprise Partnership (CWLEP), West Midlands Combined Authority and Warwickshire County Council
- Working with The University of Warwick on the development of Wellesbourne Campus
- Reviewing the Core Strategy Managing the ongoing financial constraints on the council

voles and rats so on balance they are an asset in the right place.

There's an old farmhouse I go to. Every year Swallows return to nest in the stables there. This year, with so much rain they've found it hard to find enough flying insects. Then we had some chilly nights, so the young ones, who were getting near to fledging all died; so sad.

On a happier note on a sunny Sunday morning the Blue tits prepared to leave the box, parents nearby, caterpillars twitching in their beaks, waiting- a chick halfway out of the hole. At this point the chick had never felt the sun or rain and had never actually flown before. How daunting is that. It took best part of an hour to build up the courage to make that instinct driven leap into midair. Then they were out! They and the other fledglings seemed to be everywhere, all calling to keep in touch with each other and their parents.

The trees around here are full of young; Blue tits, Great tits and Coal Tits. Within a week they have learned how to use the bird table and feeders and, importantly, to hang upside down among the leaves searching for insects. The cold and wet was the last thing they needed but with a constant food supply it saw them through. Who ever coined the phrase "Run ragged" must have been watching parent birds. Their feathers were matted, the colours darkened with all the rain. They were shadows of their former selves- run ragged literally.

Now I know why they call it "flaming June" because it hardly stopped flaming raining!

As well as visiting the projects, the trip itinerary took in some iconic cultural sights such as the Taj Mahal, Agra Fort and the Pink City.

Higher Education lecturer Katie Gazey said: "This was a very busy trip with much to see and do. We stayed in some amazing locations and met some fantastic people and saw so much wildlife. The students gained invaluable experiences and it has inspired some to fundraise for Wildlife SOS, while others are keen to volunteer in schools or orphanages like the Ladli project while taking a gap year."


You have a dial a ride bus service which operates Mondays/Wednesdays/Fridays between 09:30 am and 2.30 pm in Moreton Morrell.
