News from the Parish Council

Firstly, a huge thank you to everyone who braved the cold to turn up to celebrate the Queens Jubilee in June at the Party in the Park, despite the weather the event was a great success and it was good to see over 200 villagers enjoying the fun. A big thank you to the local bands who were brilliant and everyone involved in the organization of the event.

The Playing Field annual safety inspection has taken place and happily only a few minor issues were noted which will be remedied in the near future. If any resident or user of the play area notices any problems please contact a member of the Parish Council as soon as possible with the details, as the safety of the children using the equipment is of our utmost concern.

A meeting with Moreton Morrell College's local manager, Peter Husband, has been held and various issues were discussed including complaints received about students racing up the Farm Drive off John Taylor Way. If anyone witnesses this please try and photograph vehicles or take registrations numbers and again pass these on to a Parish Councilor as the college has promised to take action against any students driving dangerously or causing a nuisance.

There have been several serious incidents of flytipping particularly on the Newbold Pacey Road, these thankfully have been cleared quickly after reporting to the Council. The Parish Council has expressed concern to the County Council about the reduced hours the recycling centre and waste facility centre in Wellesbourne is open since the Covid outbreak and a meeting is due to be held in the near future to discuss this and other matters.

The proposed Solar Farm at Newbold Pacey was also discussed and the Parish Council has sent an objection on the proposals to Stratford District Council based on the size of the development and type of panels which we feel will dominate the landscape and could cause a distraction to drivers on this already dangerous stretch of road. This matter is due to be discussed at the District Council on August 17th.

A group of Councillor's and residents attempted to clear a footpath to Wellesbourne in July as this had come up in the village questionnaire as something that many residents would value. Good progress was made and part of the route has been cleared and marked and a further attempt will be made soon and if

anyone would like to help with this please contact Cllr Gerry Slora or Cllr Anne Parry.

Following a request for financial assistance from the Allotment Group it was agreed to fund some necessary repairs and improvements to the allotments. These are a valued village asset which give enjoyment to lots of residents and it was considered their upkeep was important.

Finally, various other issues were raised including cleaning of the bus stop and other village appearance matters. The Parish Council has tried unsuccessfully to recruit a handyman to do small jobs around the Parish. We are trying to establish if some of these jobs could be done by the lengthsman who we share with

Wellesbourne Parish Council but again if any resident would be interested in doing jobs on behalf of the Parish Council either on a voluntary basis or paid for depending on time commitment and experience, please contact Pam Routly our Parish Clerk. Contact details for the Parish Councillor's and the Parish Clerk can be found on our website: moretonmorrellpc.co.uk.

The next meeting of the Parish Council is 19th September 2022 at 7.30pm in the village hall, please do come along, it is hoped the draft village plan will be available at that meeting to share with residents and it would be good to hear your thoughts on future plans and proposals for your village.

Re DELEGATED BUDGET

At present from my delegated budget I note works on Brook Lane re the Drainage that has been completed and then the resurfacing that is programmed for 19/09/2022. These two jobs are at a cost of £10,000 from said delegated budget.

Cllr Parry contacted me with a query re Brook Lane within the SAP. The response I have received is below . Any questions do please let me know.

Stuart Buckley at the Warwickshire Property and Development Company advised:

"As I understand it this site was submitted a number of years ago by WCC in a previous call for sites and was noted as a reserve site in the local plan. The update of the plan has just re-affirmed the position".

We understand that reserve sites are only required if there is a significant fall in their Housing Land Supply or housing trajectory of the Council. At present SDC have a substantial housing land supply of 8.62 years".

General Update

Mental Health Support for Young People

A new animation from Warwickshire County Council shares genuine mental health journeys from young people in Warwickshire.

The young adults within the video, who are anonymised to protect their identities, share details of the challenges they have faced, such as self-harm and contemplating suicide. But they also talk about how they started to feel better – small acts such as going for a walk or eating well, as well as finding support on the internet or from mental health professionals. They talk about how their lives have

SEND Pilot.

Finally, as you are aware it has been a busy time within Education with the Schools White Paper and the consultation only just ending on the SEND Green Paper. During this time Warwickshire was one of 8 authorities approached by Ofsted to be involved in a Pilot framework for assessment and inspection.

A pilot was held in Warwickshire from 13th June to 1st July to help the inspection team test the new approach to assess the impact of local arrangements on children and young people with SEND and their families services, and how the local area partnership work together to plan, evaluate, and develop the SEND system.

Although there is no formal report or judgement from the pilot, the inspectors shared some valuable feedback which we will build into our improvement plans to ensure that all Warwickshire children and young people with SEND lead a fulfilling life and are part of their community.

123+ Waste Collection

The new waste collection went live on 1st August and if anyone has not yet received their food waste bins, please can they contact me. Food waste is now being collected weekly, dry recycling and subscribed green bins fortnightly and grey bins every three weeks. As part of the new 123+ waste collection service SDC has launched an App to help residents get bin collection reminders, find out what you can put in which bin and much more about other services using the App. This can be downloaded from the App Store or Google Play (Stratford District Council) or by searching www.stratford.gov.uk/app

Site Allocation Plan (SAP) Public Consultation

The public consultation for the revised SAP has now closed and followed the Call for Sites initiative last year inviting landowners and developers to put forward sites across the district to be considered by SDC as potential Reserve Sites, in the event of a shortfall on the Five Year Housing Land Supply. At present the only development that can be brought forward are those sites within the Built Up Area Boundaries (BUAB) of villages and towns, with the exception of small sites submitted for Custom and Self Build, which may be considered on sites adjacent to BUAB's.

There are three sites included in the SAP for Moreton Morrell: one off John Davis Drive (20 dwellings) and two off Brook Lane (13 dwellings); however it should be noted that the density requirement has been reduced to a ratio based on 25 dwellings per hectare in order to reflect the neighbouring character of the village.

It is my view and that of the parish council that the village will need to take some development over the next ten years to meet its growing needs and ensure the sustainability of the local primary school. However, any new development should include the provision of one or two single storey properties, as outlined in the Housing Needs Survey undertaken by MMPC in 2020 and must include the full long term protection of the playing field.

Five Year Housing Land Supply (5YHLS)

The 5YHLS is currently at 8.4 years and new updated figures are scheduled soon on calculations based up to 31 March 2022. Early indications

suggest there is unlikely to be much change in the current figure for 2022.

Fly-Tipping

I reported another major fly tipping incident last week on the road to Newbold Pacey, which fortunately SDC removed within 24 hours. There have been suggestions via social media to look at putting a camera or a CCTV sign up to suggest the area is being monitored as it appears to be a favourite spot, however contact with the landowner will be required. In the meantime, I am exploring options with the Streetscene Team.

Census 2021 First Results Release

The first results from the Census 2021 have been released and this initial release includes total population estimates for local authorities and number of households. The population of Stratford-on-Avon District, as of March 2021, was estimated by the Census to be **134,700**. The population of the District is estimated to have grown by 11.80% between 2011-2021. This is well above the average for both England and the West Midlands. Stratford-on-Avon's population saw the third highest % growth across the West Midlands, with only Rugby and

Wychavon growing more, by 14.3% and 13.3% respectively. Stratford-on-Avon's population remains weighted towards the older-end of the age spectrum compared to the regional and national averages. Over a quarter of the population are aged 65 years or over, compared to less than a fifth in the West Midlands or England & Wales. According to the latest Census figures there are now an estimated 59,500 households in the District as of 2021, compared to 51,900 in 2011 – an increase of 14.5% Since the last Census in 2011,

Since the last Census in 2011, there has been a 27.5% increase in the number of residents aged 65 years and over in the District. This compares to an increase of 6.9% in the number of residents of working age (16-64 years) and an increase of 8.5% in those aged 15 years or younger.



Rail track simulation facility opens

A new training facility has been laid at Moreton Morrell College to help develop the next generation of skilled individuals to keep the country's trains on track.

The college has partnered with RMF Group to create a new simulation rail track facility. The track gives learners the chance to perfect their track maintenance skills while working effectively as a team and preparing for a promising career in the rail industry.

The new teaching facility has cost more than £78,000 and has been funded by the Department for Education through the Skills Accelerator Development Fund. It comes after colleges across Coventry and Warwickshire

secured more than £5 million in funding through the fund to reshare technical skills training in the region.

Mark Bonham, assistant principal at WCG, has overseen the project for the college group. He said: "It's fantastic to have partnered with RMF on this project, and to see the facility now finished and operational. "The facility will enable students to gain real-world practical rail skills and also enable them to gain their workplace tickets — making them immediately employable after completing their course with us."

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
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We need your clothes and shoes
