News from the Parish Council

We were pleased to welcome a number of members of the public to our meeting in November, including Peter Husband from Warwickshire College. It was a short meeting as there were a number of apologies, but we had a very interesting presentation from the Wellesbourne Flood Action Group about the measures that they are taking to prevent flooding in Wellesbourne, including creating ponds and flood pains and creating 'leaky dams'.

The overhanging branches on Old Farm Drive should be being cut back shortly. We also noted that some stiles on local footpaths need some attention, so Cllr Gordon will be contacting the landowners. We will also be writing to Warwickshire County Council about the ongoing challenges with the footpath to Wellesbourne.

We thought it would be helpful to reiterate the role and responsibilities of the Parish Council, and our priorities for next year.

Our role

The Parish Council has variety of powers and duties that impact directly on the local community — its safety, appearance and general wellbeing.

We are responsible for the playing field, footpaths and rights of way, general village appearance, the allotments, traffic calming measures, litter and dog-fouling, all of which seem quite small issues, but make a huge difference to how we feel about living in the village.

The priorities for Moreton Morrell Parish Council in 2023 are

- Developing a Parish Plan, following the survey run in 2022.
- Continuing to update the facilities in the playing field
- Making our roads as safe as possible
- Maintaining our footpaths and other rights of way
- Supporting community activities, particularly in the Village Hall

South Warwickshire Health Matters

South Warwickshire Health Matters – Survey on Primary Healthcare Provision

This communication concerns the provision of GP and other health services as part of the new Upper Lighthorne development of 3,000 houses. As such, it affects us all, whether you live in Upper Lighthorne or in one of the neighbouring settlements, including Moreton Morrell and Moreton Paddox.

In May this year we first became aware that the provision of GP services for Upper Lighthorne is not a settled matter. Since then, **Moreton Morrell Parish Council**, along with 17 other parish councils and meetings, have come together under the name South Warwickshire Health Matters (SWHM) with a common purpose to encourage the NHS Integrated Care Board (ICB) to make the vital decisions that will affect future health provision in all of our communities. We have the support of district and county councillors, and our MP.

SWHM have compiled a statement of joint objectives for GP and health services which we include below. We ask that you complete the ICB survey intended to help them make the appropriate decisions. The

South Warwickshire Health Matters – Statement of Objectives

No resident of Upper Lighthorne should have to travel outside of Upper Lighthorne to receive GP services. We recognise that residents of Upper Lighthorne currently travel for primary healthcare, but the objective should be that this should no longer be necessary after a certain

South Warwickshire Health Matters

- level of occupancy of the new Upper Lighthorne developments.
- No surrounding parish should suffer a degradation of GP services as a consequence of primary healthcare provision for Upper **Lighthorne.** A risk of relying on existing neighbouring GP services to take on Upper Lighthorne patients is that these services become over-stretched. Dedicated provision for Upper Lighthorne is essential, and will likely reduce load on neighbouring services, but must not result
- in a reduction of existing GP services in surrounding parishes.

On site provision should

be made available as soon as practically possible.
The longer it takes to open a facility on site, the more new residents will attempt to register with facilities in surrounding villages, risking over-subscription, or difficulty in registering. The Integrated Care Board (formerly CCG) must reach a conclusion as soon as is practical so that options are not limited simply as a consequence of delay.

Dementia Café

I am working closely with Cllr Penny-Anne O'Donnell and the Dementia Café team in Wellesbourne to establish what additional help can be provided to carers and their loved ones with the support of WCC and Sir Jeremy Wright KC, MP. This is a marvellous facility, held every Wednesday afternoon, providing some respite to carers and their loved ones and open to anyone from the village looking for additional support.

GP Facilities – Upper Lighthorne

Wearing both my councillor hats I am in close liaison with neighbouring parishes regarding the provision of new GP facilities for Upper Lighthorne, as without a new, standalone medical facility this will impact on the existing high pressures of nearby GP services that residents in

Moreton Morrell currently use. Please complete the ICB Survey – details of which are being included in this edition of The Villager.

Whilst there is Section 106 monies to build a new health centre in Upper Lighthorne, in accordance with the development of GLH, the ICB (formerly CCG – Clinical Commissioning Group) appear to be dragging their feet in terms of a strategy to provide doctors and support staff and are continuing to look at all the possible options and involvement of neighbouring practices. SDC and WCC are in support of a new health centre at Upper Lighthorne.

Wellesbourne Campus

I attended a pre-consultation workshop about the University of Warwick's early stage vision for the development of the campus, which was both interesting and informative and provided attendees, including representatives from Charlecote PC to have a say and make comments on its future vision. The Wellesbourne Campus is identified for employment development and SDC is in the process of drafting an Economic Strategy which will be brought forward to Cabinet early 2023

prior to going out to consultation.

Cabinet Responsibilities

I am now the portfolio holder for economic development, inward investment and strategic partnerships, as well as tourism, transformation, ICT and communications. I am also a member of the Planning Committee.

From the Allotments

The Annual Meeting of the Allotment Association took place on November 16th and was well attended. Those present heard that the allotments had been fully let in 2022 and would be also in 2023. Whilst an existing holder had resigned this year, two others had come forward to share the vacant plot and they were welcomed as new tenants by the meeting. Business included some slight revision to the constitution; no major issues but just a review. The individual tenancy agreements have also been reviewed and updated.

Activity on the allotments slows during winter. Those who have managed to fully dig their plots in autumn are to be congratulated; some of us did not achieve this! Some harvesting continues of roots and brassicas and that great staple for these months, leeks, features in many of the plots. We are now at a time when seed catalogues are read to discover new varieties and opportunities — a time to reflect

on the successes and yes, the failures of 2022 cropping wise. As every good allotment holder knows, there is always something to learn.

It's nice to see Jupiter shining brightly in the evening sky, rising in the south east and chasing the moon. Later in the evening Orion rises from the same direction to chase both of them across the night sky; all appearing in slow motion of course. It's the closest Jupiter has been to Earth since 1963 when the Beetles were No 1 with "She Loves You". Oh! Those were the days! However in 1963 we had one of the coldest Winters ever with snow until March. . . . So here's hoping that doesn't repeat itself.

Meanwhile as I scribble this we are having one of the warmest Novembers on record. There are Bluebottles, Honey Bees, Bumble Bees and Wasps all making a go of it with many flowers enjoying the warmth, not yet cut down by the frost. I bet by the time anyone reads this (if anyone does) it will all have changed. Bats are still active and I've seen a Barn Owl near Moreton Morrell and a Tawny flying along the hedgerow out of Ashorne. It flew along the top of the hedge regularly dropping either side towards the ground, maybe trying to flush out roosting birds,

Talking of Tawny Owls, we still have them close to the cottage.

I'm guessing its the adult pair. Their position is given away a couple of times a week at the moment by very observant birds. The loud calamity of birds calling out in what must be 'abusive bird speak' is often started by a Blackbird or recently by a Jay. Quickly other species arrive. Chaffinches seem to particularly enjoy the action along with Great Tits, Blue Tits, Jackdaws and Robins. Even heard a Nuthatch join the throng. I do feel sorry for the 'picked on' Owl that will sit tight and hope it all goes away whilst perched on one of the many Yew trees. The other birds take exception to the bird of prey even though it was quietly minding its own business. Sooner or later the bird mob wear themselves out and disperse only to repeat the exercise in a day or so. The only good thing is I know exactly where our Tawny Owl roosts.

A few hundred yards from the Owl is a very large tree that stands tall and wide and catches the early morning sunshine. This has become the hub for a large flock of Fieldfare and Redwing. I'm not sure if these spend the night there or just arrive. Its a great meeting place for them as they chatter, not unlike the Starlings but with more melody. They can be heard half a field away.

Nature Watch

Down on the ground we've had another eight Hedgehogs released over the past couple of weeks. That must bring us up to around sixty in the last couple of years. We've even had at least one hang around for me to glimpse. We should be "Hedgehogs are Us!" around here but, as its their nature, to disperse I very rarely see one. Hopefully most of them are still out there and we'll keep trickling them into the community.

Professor named on review board for new scientific journal

A Moreton Morrell College professor has been named on the editorial review board for a major new scientific journal.

Professor Richard J. Pearce, associate professor for Animal Ecology and Biodiversity Research at Warwickshire College and University Centre (WCUC), has been appointed to the editorial review board for Frontiers in Arachnid Science.

Professor Pearce is a nationallyrenowned arachnologist, and runs his research programme from a laboratory at the college.

He is currently focusing on a long-term research project that investigates the ecological impact of solar farm installations, assessing the consequences and benefits from a biodiversity standpoint.

"I'm delighted to have been appointed to the editorial review board of what will be a vital new platform for the study of arachnids," said Professor Pearce.

"This will be an open access journal which is important and will mean the material can reach a much wider audience. There is

an absolute need for a journal in this area of research and I am excited to be a part of it.

"This is great news for WCUC and our ongoing development of a robust and internationally recognised research profile."

College helps flood prevention work in Wellesbourne

A vital project to help minimise the impact of flooding on people living in Wellesbourne has been completed by a local voluntary organisation with the help of Moreton Morrell College.

Wellesbourne and Walton Flood Action Group (WWFAG) has been working with the college, to help slow the flow of Newbold Brook, which runs through the north of Wellesbourne.

Its work comes after a hydrological survey of the catchment area was commissioned in 2019.

The group has created a channel at Bog Brook, so when the brook floods the rising waters are channelled into a bog field. Works have created three holding ponds in the field, which can be filled with excess water from the brook.

Moreton Morrell College is planting wildflowers along the

new earth bund on the perimeter of the field and the new ponds are set to become a popular wildlife habitat.

Stephen Kirk, Chair of WWFAG, said: "We are pleased to have completed the first stage of works to help minimise major flooding in Wellesbourne.

"We would like to thank Moreton Morrell College for their support during the project and look forward to working with them on stage two."



Leading equestrian figure made fellow of Moreton Morrell College

A leading figure in the equestrian industry has been presented with a fellowship from Moreton Morrell College – which she has supported for more than 40 years.

Judy Edwards, who led The Pony Club for 10 years, has been named a fellow of Warwickshire College and University Centre (WCUC).

The award is in recognition of her significant contribution to the equestrian provision at Moreton Morrell College, which is part of WCUC, and the leading role she played in the development of the wider equestrian industry.

She has judged the horse trials at the college since their inception and was the first to represent the equestrian interests of the college on the Board of Governors.

Judy said: "I am extremely surprised, proud, and honoured to have been made a fellow.

"Over the years I have enjoyed my involvement with the college, be that on the board of governors, or as show jumping judge.

"Moreton Morrell College was the first to introduce courses in the equine area and those courses have now developed into degree courses.

"Being a fellow will give me opportunities to continue my involvement with the college and support the development of more skilled individuals for the equine sector."

Tom is in his second year studying for a degree in Equine Therapy and Rehabilitation and will receive £500 under the scheme.


He joined the college after being impressed with the equine therapy facilities, despite initially considering a degree in geography.


