News from the Parish Council

Thank you to everyone who attended the 'meet the councillors' event before the Parish Council Meeting on Monday 20th January, and particularly to those who stayed for the meeting. It was great to meet some new faces and hear good ideas for the development of the village. At our meeting we discussed a number of important issues:

Playing Field:

We have had a thorough report back from the safety inspection (available on the parish council website,

www.moretonmorrellpc.org.uk).

You may have noticed that the climbing frame has been taped off – this is because it was deemed unsafe, so we will be removing that and the monkey bars. We really do want to refurbish the playing field to make it a welcoming and relaxing space for everyone in the village, so we are asking for your input on what you would like to see there. We have some funds put aside, but if you would like to get involved with fundraising for new equipment, please let us know.

This is so that should Moreton Morrell be asked to take on more housing developments we will have a really good understanding of what is needed in the village. MORETON MORRELL HOUSING NEEDS SURVEY

Moreton Morrell Parish Council is planning to invest in a range of new recreational equipment and facilities for the village playing field and wishes to hear from local residents about your preferences on what equipment should be considered on our recreational facility for young children, youths and adults.

The Parish Council has commissioned an inspection of all the play equipment and the detailed report has identified that there are some items which require replacing/refurbishment, which is why it has been necessary to prevent continued use on some existing apparatus for health and safety reasons. most favoured choices. Results of the survey will be released at the next parish council meeting in March.

District Matters Wellesbourne Airfield

Wellesbourne Airfield continues to be high on the agenda at Stratford -on-Avon District Council (SDC) and much work has been undertaken by Cabinet members to protect the existing business interests. Its commitment to ensure that the flying functions at the airfield are retained will continue to be at the forefront of negotiations with the owners, as any deviation from this stance would provide the evidence to trigger the compulsory purchase order.

Green Waste

Financial pressures are continuing to impact at a district level and the introduction of a green waste levy in 2020 received Full Council approval in December. It is worth noting that the SDC Council Tax only represents 40% of all funding that is received and SDC currently only gets £139.12 for a Band D property. The Council has seen a reduction of £7m of Central Government funding in recent years.

Whilst the collection of green waste is a discretionary service, 70% of district and borough councils throughout the UK are now having to charge for the fortnightly collection of green waste. The proposed charge of £40 per green bin equates to 80p per week and residents with small gardens may find it to be both cost saving and practical to share a green bin with their neighbour, however up to three food caddies will be provided on request and emptied free of charge for everyone.

Gardeners are also encouraged to compost at home, where space permits, as this is an inexpensive, natural process which can transform kitchen and green waste into free nutrient-rich food for the garden, which is environmentally friendly.

Full Council

It is a busy time at present looking at budgets and yes there will be an increase in Council Tax in the region of around £5 by Stratford District Council (SDC) to a Band D property with this increase being pro-rata for other bands. It is worth highlighting that SDC only keeps a fraction of the Council Tax it collects – in fact just 7.8%; the County Council gets 77.3% and the Police 11.5%.

District and County News cont.

County Road Safety

Contractors have been commissioned to deal with the pothole outside the school and as this is major works which involve digging up the road this has been scheduled for the Easter School Holidays to avoid as little disruption and minimise chaos during the school day. In the meantime WCC will continue to repair the pot hole until this permanent solution can be implemented. Repairs to potholes have also been carried out in recent weeks.

Climate Change

Climate Change is widely agreed to be the most important environmental driver of economic and societal change for the 21st century and the climate change agenda has featured strongly both at a district and county level. A considerable amount of work has already been undertaken by both authorities by the respective Task

and Finish Groups and 2020 will start to see the fruition of their efforts. WCC is committed to tackling climate change and it is working towards a properly costed plan with targets for the short, medium and long term.

Adult Social Care

Adult Social Care and Health is another extremely important area and WCC currently spends well in excess of £150 million in delivering and providing personal health care throughout the county. With an ageing population the demand on these services is increasing rapidly and a further 2% increase in the Council Tax, which is ring-fenced to Adult Social Care and Health, is to be expected plus an increase in the region of 2.99% for the other services which will include a budget for Climate Change.

Nature Watch

The light begins to fade as the moon rises in the south east. Venus shines brightly above the silhouette of fir trees in the south west. From the south I hear them. coming, calling and chatting all the way. Their black shapes begin to appear. A flock of over 200 birds: Rooks mixed with smaller Jackdaws. All day they've been feeding on the fields, now it's time to travel back to the roost. As they pass over, flying high above the trees, many of them in pairs, suddenly their mood changes. In a moment the whole flock swerves and flies back the way it came. Then, like a shoal of fish, they dive, dropping at least a hundred feet, then swoop passed the trees. All calling loudly, they rose back up high again and continued to the roost as if nothing had happened. Did one or two birds start that display or is it the whole flock so in tune it was a spontaneous display?

Everyone off to bed then, including us. It was about 2am when I was woken by a Fox. It called four short, sharp barks. Probably the Dog calling for the Vixen. Hope it's the same pair as last year. It was brilliant to watch them and their seven Cubs up close. Hope we get lucky again.

Morning came much too fast, still dark and the Robins were singing. As it slowly became light the Rooks flew back over the cottage again heading for their fields. This time our 40 plus Jackdaws came in low and fast, landing in the old Walnut tree. In a moment they're off again. It's the same every morning. They do fast circuits of the cottages and trees calling loudly. They land back in the Walnut tree then repeat it all several times. They must be glad it's a new day or just sorting themselves out.

Meanwhile on the grass under the Cedar tree two Squirrels were getting acquainted. Usually the adults tolerate each other or resort to bullying. This must have been a female followed by a male. Each time he caught her up she would move on, but only slowly. She was obviously playing the 'long game'. Squirrels can give birth as early as January if things are right. The babies are called 'Kits'. I'll keep an eye out for them.

We've got an uncountable amount of Blue Tits and Great Tits coming to feed. Uncountable because each time I count to about ten of each they all move, so who knows how many there are. One of the Great Tits was different though. It stayed close to the


cottage, didn't fly strongly and at night it perched on a wreath hanging on the back door that was attached by the porch light. It wasn't well. I was able to feed it by hand and it would drink from a dish I held up. After a few days it disappeared. Very glad I met it for a short while.

Many people seem to dislike January saying how it drags. I don't see it like that. Once we pass the shortest saying dark December and move into January we get a couple of minutes more light each day. Primroses are out and Snowdrops are nodding their

heads. We now have Robins, Great Tits, Mistle Thrush, Wood Pigeon, Stock Dove all singing and - one ahead of schedule-Blackbird! sounding gorgeous on the neon Sainsbury's sign after dark. "Other supermarkets are available!"

We are pointing the right way for Spring. Just don't hold your breath.

Green team cracking down on single use plastics

A new green team has been launched at Moreton Morrell College, part of WCG, to help crack down on single use plastics and reduce the college's carbon footprint.

In 2019, WCG was awarded The Planet Mark sustainability certificate for a fifth consecutive year – which recognises an organisation making year-on-year reductions in its carbon emissions.

The green team will build on this, and among other aims, be tasked with eradicating unnecessary single use plastic and will be working alongside staff and students to achieve this aim. New signage and guidance will be put up across the college to encourage recycling, and litter picking will be carried out by volunteers to keep the site clean. 
