### News from the Parish Council

#### Village Hall Update

The trustees of the village hall have commissioned a specialist structural engineer's report which follows the full building survey undertaken by McKelvie Lloyd earlier this year.

Consequently, the hall is not available to hire for events or meetings until the findings of the structural engineer's report are known, together with a costings estimate of any essential safety repairs/refurbishment works which may be required.

In the meantime, The Room provides a much welcomed and warm community space.

### **Defibrillator Training**

Our thanks are extended to Dr Duncan Gordon who has kindly offered to provide defibrillator training to villagers on Saturday 14<sup>th</sup> October at 2pm in The Room. Villagers are encouraged to put the date in their diary and attend in order to learn or sharpen their lifesaving CPR skills at this important event.

#### **Playing Field Matters**

The condition of the nets to the small football goals on the playing field was raised at the September

parish council meeting by one of the villagers and it was unanimously agreed that these should be replaced at the earliest opportunity.

#### **New Website**

The parish council has commissioned a new website for Moreton Morrell, in order to improve accessibility and provide improved communications to residents across the parish. It is hoped that the new website will be operational by the end of the year.

#### **Moreton Morrell Parish Plan**

The new Parish Plan is in its final stages of drafting, awaiting a response from the policy team at Stratford-on-Avon District Council and will then proceed to the design stage. Following approval at the next parish council meeting in November, it is planned to hold a public consultation event for villagers on the new parish plan in order to make any final amendments before being adopted in 2024.

### Dog Fouling

The Parish Council continues to receive complaints about irresponsible dog owners who fail to pick up and dispose of their dog's business in the most

appropriate way, either by taking it home with them to put in their black bin or one of the many dog bins which are strategically located around the village. Farm drive appears to be a particularly bad area for dog fouling and such behaviour is totally unacceptable, as is the dumping of large household bags of dog poo into the village waste bins rather than your own black bin.

#### **Dogs off Leads**

Dog owners are respectively reminded that dogs off leads are totally prohibited on the playing field due to the health and safety risks to all children and adults. As highlighted on the signage, displayed around the playing field, dogs must be controlled on a lead by their owners at all times in order to access the public footpaths which adjoin this protected area. The parish council has a zero tolerance policy on this matter, which is applicable to every canine breed or cross breed and therefore also applies to dogs which may be particularly small or which are deemed to be well trained by their owners.

In view of the recent dog related incidents as reported in the national media, the parish council

has consequently contacted the Environmental Health team at Stratford District Council which has the powers to enforce dogrelated by-laws and the Public Spaces Protection (Dog Fouling) Order 2020.

Moreton Morrell welcomes responsible dog owners, but will be forced to take appropriate action where necessary.

#### **Footpaths**

Members of the parish council are forming a working party to ensure the network of footpaths are accessible and safe to use. In addition, plans are being developed to produce a useful footpaths map for villagers and visitors to use more frequently which will help to maintain the footpaths in and around the village.

#### **Parish Council Meeting**

The next parish council meeting will be held at The Room on Monday 20<sup>th</sup> November 2023 at 7.30pm and all villagers are welcome to attend.

# Success of 123+ Waste Collection Service

Changes to Stratford-on-Avon
District Council's rubbish and
recycling collections introduced a
year ago have been a success,
with figures showing a reduction in
the amount of rubbish being
disposed of and residents
recycling more than two-thirds of
all household waste collected in
the District.

In the first year of operation, figures show that 68% of the District's rubbish has been recycled and 26% less residual waste was collected. During the period August 2022 to July 2023, 16,226 tonnes of residual waste was collected, which is 5,635 tonnes less than the same period the previous year.

The introduction of a separate weekly food waste collection service has seen 4,888 tonnes collected between August 2022 and July 2023. The new 123+ waste collection service was introduced on 1 August 2022 to boost recycling rates and reduce the amount of general waste.

One year on, the figures show that the three-weekly refuse collection arrangements have reduced the amount of general rubbish each household puts out and has encouraged residents to recycle more.

Whilst members of the new administration were not in support of the service last year, it is hoped that no changes will be made in view of its success.

# Shakespeare's England Partners with Destination Coventry

Shakespeare's England is partnering with Destination Coventry to form the Coventry & Warwickshire Destination Partnership. The new partnership has been formed under the new Local Visitor Economy Partnership (LVEP) framework, which was developed and administered by VisitEngland as a result of the government's response to the independent de Bois Review of **Destination Management** Organisations in England, with the overarching aim of supporting and growing the visitor economy. It will see both organisations

working together strategically with local authorities to ensure that Coventry and Warwickshire's tourism community has a powerful voice at national level regarding future policies.

#### **Upper Lighthorne GP Facility**

It is understood that up to four local practices have expressed an interest in tendering for the new Upper Lighthorne GP Facility and they will be expected to respond to a brief from the ICB this year. The chairman of SDC's OSC committee has invited the ICB to a meeting on 3<sup>rd</sup> November when questions regarding the new GP facility and the Ellen Badger Hospital amongst other topics will be raised. I have also been advised that SDC are in discussions with Warwickshire Police to establish their involvement in the proposed new community hub in Upper Lighthorne.

#### **Brook House Dental Practice**

The dental practice in Moreton Morrell is sadly closing with effect from 30<sup>th</sup> November 2023 as it is no longer financially viable to keep the dental practice open. This means that patients will need to find alternative NHS dental care going forward. I am sure you will all join me in thanking Dr Fiona Smart and her team for all their care over the years.

According to the website it is likely that patients can be transferred to an NHS dental practice in Shipston -on-Stour along with Dr Holly Finley. Other NHS dental providers can be found online using www.nhs.uk/service-search/find-a -dentist and I have been contacted by Nuvo Dental Warwick (formerly Westgate Dental Practice), to advise that they are welcoming patients from Brook House.

The next Full Council Meeting is scheduled for Monday October 16<sup>th</sup> 2023.

The Room continues to be the host venue for Tasty Tuesdays, free



### October Nature Page

As I scribble this, through the bedroom window comes the sound of our very chatty Raven still proclaiming his territory as evening draws near.

Well! I for one am glad the heatwave has gone. Sorry if you were a fan of the hot weather. It took its toll on wildlife. Bumble Bees stop flying when the temperature rises to around 30\*c. Not surprising with a fur coat on. Honey Bees cope better but hive communities can suffer. Wild flowers and even nettles can wilt and get scorched. Caterpillars may then die, so less for the birds to eat and less pollinating for the Bumbles.

Badgers and Hedgehogs (not the best of friends) suffer with the soil being baked. Worms dig further down to escape the heat and find moisture so less food and dangerously less water available. Whenever there's a hot or even a warm spell, if you put out a shallow dish of water and keep them

topped up they will be a lifeline to Hedgehogs, small mammals and birds. Perhaps keep them away from bushes to stop cats planning an ambush of the birds.

Once we arrived at the first day or two of August the Robins began to sing as always. Their moulting was done, fresh new feathers were in place to keep them warmer in the Winter. The kids were on their own now, so territories were being established to space themselves out to give enough area to find food.

The Tawny Owls are still having their evening chats. There was a lovely encounter a couple of nights ago. An adult approached the often mentioned Cedar Tree. It gave a very soft 'Whoo'. It was answered by another adult with a 'Keik Kreik". The first adult replied with an even softer 'Whoooo' this time with a wobble to it. Now if that wasn't a heartfelt 'I'm glad to see you' call then I don't know what was.

Going back to pre heatwave and pre accident - I was on the veg plot as the light was beginning to fade. Something small moved over to my right. A Hedgehog bustled through



Sophie and her horse Dodington came fifth in the BE100 Open category, with Molly drawing on her two years of eventing experience to take home the bronze in the BE90 Under 18 category with her horse Knockateemore Patch.

Wayne Rodwell, Equine Events and Sports Coordinator at Moreton Morrell College, said: "The event is a fantastic way for our students to experience elite competition and develop new skills amongst the excellent facilities on offer at Moreton Morrell College."


